1. Carefully state the definition of “basis”. Give two bases for $P_2(t)$.

2. Let u, v be nonzero vectors in an arbitrary inner product space. Prove that if u is orthogonal to v then $\text{proj}(u, v) = \bar{0}$.

The remaining three problems are all in vector space $V = \mathbb{R}^2$, with inner product $\langle \cdot, \cdot \rangle_*$ given by $\langle u, v \rangle_* = u^T \begin{pmatrix} 4 & 1 \\ 1 & 3 \end{pmatrix} v$. (here u, v are column vectors).

3. Let $a = (1, 1)^T$ and $b = (-1, 3)^T$. Calculate $\langle a, a \rangle_*$, $\langle a, b \rangle_*$, $\langle b, b \rangle_*$.

4. Let $a = (1, 1)^T$ and $b = (-1, 3)^T$. Find vectors c, d such that $a = c + d$, c is a multiple of b , and d is orthogonal to b (in the $\langle \cdot, \cdot \rangle_*$ sense).

5. Starting with $\{(1, 0)^T, (0, 1)^T\}$, use Gram-Schmidt to find an orthonormal basis for V . (in the $\langle \cdot, \cdot \rangle_*$ sense).
